I had no idea at the time that she was perpetrating an elaborate fraud against me, and I acted with only the best of intentions toward her.

Then one day I received a call from my sister telling me that Lacy did not have any kind of cancer at all and had never had any type of cancer.

She referred me to a website, which told a grim story.

I was able to read about other crimes Lacy had committed and later received calls from victims and investigators in pursuit of her. I could not believe she was hurting so many unsuspecting people.

And I was out approximately \$200,000 because she lied to me from the beginning.
